

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## It's all here. How to build a life-supporting economy

The "Story of Stuff" film: the big picture

The "Story of Stuff" is a clear, blunt, simple and often humorous presentation by Annie Leonard which lays out the problem with



our economic system and shows us the big picture of our destructive economic system. If this film doesn't make you rethink how we run our lives I don't know what will! It is worth spending the 21 minutes you feel you don't have!

She graphically unfolds the story we've bought into for

**several decades**; namely that our main value and purpose as human beings is to consume stuff. We have believed that growing the economy is the number one priority for our being here on Earth. The big problem is that this linear system of extraction of natural resources and exploitation of labor to make cheap goods for the profit of a few does not work on a finite planet. She presents a staggering collection of shocking facts about the exploitation of resources and people, the pollution that results from our production, and the trash created by all the stuff. *Read this astonishing statement made by retail analyst Victor Lebow in 1955, and reckon with the fact that this is exactly what we've done for 65 years!* 

"Our enormously productive economy demands that we make consumption our way of life, that we convert the buying and use of goods into rituals, that we seek our spiritual satisfaction and our ego satisfaction in consumption. We need things consumed, burned up, worn out, replaced and discarded at an ever-increasing rate." —Victor Lebow



#### Stepping Out of the Consumer Culture

As we reckon with the multiple crises we are dealing with in our world, one imperative is that we have to become more conscious and careful about what and how we consume. The conundrum is that we have been raised on the "mother's milk" of the consumption of stuff as the one thing that will nourish us, physically, emotionally and spiritually. As someone has said, "Consumerism is the most successful religion on the planet."

The first step to leave behind this consumer habit is to take a close look at the harmful effects this has on all life on Earth, and to imagine another, more fulfilling way of life. We need to abandon GDP as our primary measure of progress. There are other ways to measure our prosperity like the <a href="Genuine Progress Indicator">Genuine Progress Indicator</a> which takes into account environmental and social factors in measuring the true health of a nation's economy.
